



### World Humanitarian Day by Rickie Zarb

"Every year on August 19th we mark World Humanitarian Day in honor of aid workers, who have lost their lives in the line of duty. We commemorate their sacrifice and reaffirm our commitment to the lifesaving work that humanitarians carry out around the world every day, often in difficult and dangerous circumstances, where others cannot or do not want to go." (World Humanitarian Day, 2014).

In 2012 65 million people received humanitarian assistance with \$5.5 billion humanitarian funding from the US. Turkey was the fourth largest non-OECD DAC government donor of international humanitarian aide. Hurricane Sandy was the 2012 most expensive disaster. Conflict and persecution displaced 45.2 million

people by the end of 2012 forcing them to leave their homes for safety. (Data and Trends, 2014).

Financing for humanitarian assistance is made through a Central Emergency Response Fund of which multiple countries contribute. Through this fund the humanitarian response providers have greater effectiveness in the access of the funds. A variety of programs are set up by the United Nations to provide assistance in the form of food to those who are starving, or provide camps for those displaced from their homes. The World Health Organization, Unicef, Save the Children, World Food Programs, are just a few of these programs. (*Workstream*, 2014) and (*Humanitarian*, 2014).

World Humanitarian Day was established so that we are more aware of humanitarian assistance worldwide and what is being done internationally.

By dedicating time as a volunteer you help to expand your network and boost your social skills. You will meet new people, especially in your local area which will strengthen your tie to the community and broaden your support network by exposing yourself to people with common interest, neighborhood resources and fun and fulfilling activities. (HelpfulGuide.org, n.d.). One other great benefit is that you can also volunteer as a family. "You will have a richer and more enjoyable volunteering experience if you first take some time to identify your goals and interests. Start by thinking about why you want to volunteer. Also think about what you would enjoy doing. Volunteer opportunities that match both your goals and your interests are most likely to be fun and fulfilling for you." (HelpfulGuide.org, n.d.).

#### Getting the most out of volunteering

"You're donating your valuable time, so it's important that you enjoy and benefit from your volunteering. It's important to make sure that your volunteer position is a good fit and to communicate with the people you're working with in the volunteer organization.

- Ask questions. You want to make sure that the experience is right for your skills, your goals, and the time you want to spend. If you have any questions, be sure to speak up. Sample questions to your volunteer coordinator might address your time commitment, if there's any training involved, who you will be working with, and what to do if you have questions during your experience.
- Make sure you know what's expected. Before starting, make sure you are comfortable with the
  organization, know what is expected, and understand the time commitment. Consider starting small
  so that you don't over commit yourself at first. Give yourself some flexibility to change your focus if
  needed.
- **Don't be afraid to make a change.** Speak up if your experience isn't what you expected. Don't force yourself into a bad fit. Talk to the organization about changing your focus or consider looking for another match.
- Enjoy yourself. Most importantly, make sure you're having fun! The best volunteer experiences benefit both the volunteer and the organization. If you're not enjoying yourself, ask yourself why. Is it the tasks you're performing? The people you're working with? Or are you uncomfortable simply because the situation is new and familiar? Pinpointing what's bothering you can help you decide how to proceed." (HelpfulGuide.org, n.d.).

<u>Volunteer opportunities</u>: As mentioned earlier, volunteer opportunities can be found in your local communities, after-school programs, places of worship, or etc. Kaplan Chapter of Golden Key has numerous opportunities this year for you to choose from. The interesting things that happened this month in history can be found on the History Place website:

"August 3, 1492—Christopher Columbus set sail from Palos, Spain with three ships *Nina*, *Pinta* and *Santa Maria*. Seeking a westerly route to the Far East, he instead landed on October 12th in the Bahamas, thinking it was an outlying Japanese island.

**August 15, 1969**—Woodstock began in a field near Yasgur's Farm at Bethel, New York. The three-day concert featured 24 rock bands and drew a crowd of more than 300,000 young people. The event came to symbolize the counter-culture movement of the 1960's.



August 21, 1959—President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed a proclamation admitting Hawaii to the Union as the 50th state.

**August 29, 1991**—Following the unsuccessful coup of August 19-21, the Soviet Communist Party was suspended, thus ending the institution that ruled Soviet Russia for nearly 75 years." (The History Place, n.d.).

### Back to School Tips by Rickie Zarb

For those students who are uneasy about starting school, point out the positive points of starting school. They can make new friends, maybe see old ones, reminisce about the positive memories of prior years, find a new friend to walk to school with or ride the bus with, or have Mom or Dad take them on the first day.

Backpacks can get heavy as children start carrying large textbooks back and forth from school. Make sure the shoulder pads are wide

and padded. Have your child use both shoulder straps to prevent muscle strain. Place the heavier items in the center of the backpack to even the weight on both shoulders. Students that need to bring home a heavy load each night may want to get a rolling backpack if the school allows. Stairs or snow may not be suitable for the rolling type, nor do they easily fit into most lockers.

Discuss the basic rules of traveling to and from school, such as exiting and boarding a bus at safe locations, wait for the bus from the curb, when walking around a school bus make sure the driver can see the child, and utilize the bus seatbelts if present. Car riders should wear seat belts at all times or ride in an appropriate car seat. Children younger than 13 yrs of age should ride in the back seat of vehicles. Teen drivers should be limited in their transport of friends as that is when many of the accidents occur as they get distracted. Do not allow drinking, eating, or cell phone conversations while driving. Those students riding a bike to school should wear a helmet and ride on the right side of the road. Bright clothing should be worn so as to be more visible to drivers.

Your child may not like some school lunches, so plan ahead for these days and maybe pack a lunch on that day. Make sure your child is eating healthy at school and not just eating sugar and empty nutrient snacks as a substitute for meals. Most importantly schedule a time for homework and play time on a regular basis. Having enough sleep at night will help your child focus during the day. (*Back to School Tips*, 2014.).

### Prostate Cancer by John McIntyre

Prostate cancer is a disease affecting the male population. This cancer forms in the reproductive system in a gland below the bladder and in front of the rectum (National Institute of Health, 2014). It occurs

typically in older men at the rate of 233,000 (2014), 239,000 (2013) with a death rate over 29,000 (National Institute of Health, 2014). The growths in the prostate are either benign or malignant. The list below details the differences.

Benign growths (such as benign prostatic hypertrophy):

Is rarely a threat to life

Don't invade the tissues around them

Don't spread to other parts of the body

Can be removed and usually don't grow back



Malignant growths (prostate cancer):

May sometimes be a threat to life

Can invade nearby organs and tissues (such as the bladder or rectum)

Can spread to other parts of the body

Often can be removed but sometimes grow back

(National Institute of Health, 2014)

The cancer can spread by breaking away from its original source known as metastatic cancer, it is still prostate cancer even if spread to another organ or the bones (National Institute of Health, 2014). This is why the treatment will be for prostate cancer, even upon spreading, since they are prostate cancer cells (National Institute of Health, 2014). The treatment options vary between individuals requiring the patient to gain an understanding of the disease and treatments. Treatment options depend upon the age, general heath, and stage of cancer, symptoms, and Gleason score of the patient (National Institute of Health, 2014). Treatment includes active surveillance (monitoring), surgery, radiation therapy, hormone therapy, chemotherapy, and immunotherapies or a combination of these therapies (National Institute of Health, 2014). 



### School Success by Rickie Zarb

We hear about the ratings of schools with a letter grade each year. We know that the lower the letter the better the school, but by what criteria is a school measured? Elementary and Middle schools have key performance indicators of Academic Achievement, weighted 25%, Academic growth, weighted 50%, and Academic growth gaps, weighted 25%. High Schools have the following key performance indicators; Academic Achievement, weighted 15%, Academic growth, weighted 35%, Academic Growth Gaps, weighted

15%, and College and Career Readiness, weighted 35%. (ColoradoSchoolGrades.com, 2013)

There is a 3-step process for national ranking of High Schools; the first two ensure that the school is serving all its students, using the state proficiency tests as a benchmark. Step 1 measures how the students are performing as compared to the average student in the state. Economically disadvantaged students are taken into consideration. Step 2 determines whether the school's least advantaged student is performing better than the average of these students in the state. Step 3



measures college readiness performance. The advanced placement (AP) test data is used as one of the benchmarks. The percentage of these students is calculated by totaling the number of students taking at least one AP or International Baccalaureate test and then dividing by the number of 12<sup>th</sup> graders, and how well they did on the test. (Morse, 2014).

### Mango Nut bread by Rickie Zarb

Yields 2 loaves

**Ingredients:** 

2 cups all purpose flour

1/2 cup white sugar

1/2 cup brown sugar

1 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1/2—1 cup walnuts


3 eggs

1/2 cup vegetable oil (canola oil)

1 teaspoon vanilla

2 cups cubed or mashed mangos

1/2 –1 cup raisins



- 2. In a large bowl, combine the first 5 ingredients. In another bowl, beat the eggs, oil, and vanilla. Stir into the dry ingredients until moistened. Stir in the raisins, mangoes, and nuts. (Batter will be stiff)
- 3. Spoon onto 2 greased 4 x 8 inch loaf pans. Bake at 350 for 50-55 minutes or until toothpick inserted near the center comes out clean. Cool for 10 minutes before removing from pans to wire racks. (McElvey, 2010).
